

## About This Module

<b>Overview</b>	Parks provide many benefits to people and the environment. The following activities help youth explore and appreciate the value of their local parks.
<b>Guiding Questions*</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What parks do we have in our area, and what are their features?</li> <li>• What is the National Park Service, and what National Park sites are available in our area?</li> <li>• Why are emblems important?</li> <li>• What features would you include if you were designing a park?</li> </ul> <p>*Guiding questions are not specifically asked in the activities themselves but are meant to guide your preparation and facilitation of the module. Keep these questions top of mind so you can help youth make connections and capture key takeaways relating to the topic.</p>
<b>Activity 1</b>	<b>Parks in My Community</b> Youth learn how to use maps and online search tools to discover the parks in their community and surrounding area.
<b>Activity 2</b>	<b>Be a Newscaster</b> Youth research a park and create a mini newscast to share about the park's unique features. Participants also learn how the National Park Service protects a diversity of natural and cultural areas.
<b>Activity 3</b>	<b>NPS Arrowhead – What's Your Emblem?</b> Youth learn about the significance of the National Park Service and BGCA emblems. Then they create their own emblems to represent something significant about themselves.
<b>Activity 4</b>	<b>Plan a Park</b> Youth design their ideal parks to gain an understanding of the many decisions that go into planning parks and related careers.

<b>Protect</b>	To keep something safe.
<b>Preserve</b>	To make something last a long time.

## Background Information

Parks provide so many benefits to people and the environment. Here’s a sampling of reasons why we should help youth discover parks in their nation and community:

- Parks provide a place where people can get outdoors and be physically active.
- Parks provide a place where community members can gather for recreation and positive social interactions.
- Studies have shown that leisure activities in parks improve moods and reduce stress.
- Parks provide economic value by increasing property values nearby.
- Parks keep our environment healthy by improving water quality, protecting groundwater, preventing flooding and improving air quality.
- Parks provide critical habitats for wildlife.
- Parks provide green space in urban areas.
- Community recreation programs at public parks provide youth with a safe place to play.
